




Concept Eight

This concept basically defines the responsibilities and influence that were outlined in the earlier concepts. It sets a boundary of the trustees in the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. and A.A. World Services, Inc. to the sort of oversight accomplished by electing the directors of these separate companies, but essentially discouraging them from assuming the daily role of executives or administrators of these entities. For me, this concept opens my mind to thinking how I should back off from trying to fix others and stay focused on what I need to accomplish in my life. I would be better off taking care of my own responsibilities than being too concerned on others affairs.

Step Eight

Made a list of all persons we had harmed and became willing to make amends to them all.

Having loosened the knot of resentment by working step 4, and having allowed God to effect change

in our darkest closets in steps 5, 6 and 7, we turn from cleaning house to cleaning up our yard.

Our resentments were killers, no question. But they were not the sole causes fertilizing our alcoholic shame and fragile self-opinion. The suffering we caused others while hungrily pursuing the bottle is an infection--- a festering sliver deep beneath the alcoholic's skin that, if left untreated, could grow into a full blown sickness, leading invariably back to his primary remedy for pain--- alcohol.

In step 8, we recovering alcoholics seek to set the balance right by making a thorough list of those persons who paid the price for our blind self-indulgence. We look back at the strides we have made in the preceding steps and find in ourselves the willingness to face those people we have wronged. Now that the true motives behind our resentments have been exposed, and knowing that God provides the strength needed to overcome our weaknesses, we openly and confidently prepare to look in the eye those persons we have harmed, and make our amends, simply and honestly, so long as no further harm comes to them or others.

We realize we are on the true path. For an alcoholic to own up to his behavior is contrary action---the very sort of contrary action that fuels spiritual growth, freedom, happiness, and an easy, intuitive grasp on life situations that before was unimaginable. We realize that our faith-filled action will not return void, and that the hope we placed in God and the 12 steps is paying dividends well beyond our wildest expectations.
