Tradition Five

"Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers"

The 12 Steps and 12 Traditions say "the very life of our Fellowship requires the preservation of this principle". This implies singleness of purpose, that for our sake and the sake of the new person we confine our discussions and sharing to recovery from alcoholism. And yet it seems we hear about everything but recovery. There is a fixation with drunk-a-logs, with members trying to out bottom each other with how bad they were. There's the "all addictions are the same", so talk about whatever you want. There is very little observance of the rules of a closed meeting (don't want to hurt anyone's feelings? How about the real alcoholic looking for a safe place to discuss recovery from alcoholism?) And there seems to be a new train of thought being expressed that "relapse is a part of recovery". Where in the big book is that?

Chapter 7 of the Big Book tells us to carry this message. Not only because we must pass on what has been so freely given us, but to insure our immunity from drinking. If this is what I am directed to do as a sober member of Alcoholics Anonymous, then it would seem to me that is what every meeting should be carrying, the message. What is the message your home group carries, or meetings you attend carry? Is it the message of recovery from alcoholism through the spiritual principles embodied in 12 steps of Alcoholics Anonymous? Perhaps each one of us needs to look at our meeting(s) and see if we are living up to, and abiding by Tradition 5. The threats to the life of Alcoholics Anonymous are not the treatment centers, the media, etc. The threat comes from within by allowing people to ignore the traditions in general, and tradition 5 in particular, and talk about everything except recovery.



Ebby's Miracle Was Ours

Ebby T. was in lukewarm water with the Manchester, Vermont, law officials. He had caused noticeable commotion in January of 1929 when he and Bill W. hired a barnstormer pilot to fly them into the local Equinox airport. Airplanes were a big deal in those days, so they informed city officials their time of arrival. A large gathering awaited in anticipation, only to observe both Bill and Ebby stumble and fall to the ground as they disgracefully and drunkenly disembarked. On a later occasion, Ebby slammed his car into the side of his terrified

neighbors house. Upon exit he asked the lady for a cup of coffee. She called the constable instead. Such hi-jinks certainly heated the legal waters for Ebby. But Ebby's legal temperature was raised to boiling when he was reported for drunkenly shooting pigeons off the roof of his beautiful home in a very prestigious neighborhood—he faced six months incarceration!

Luckily, his Oxford Group friend, State Senator, Cebra Graves (his father was the judge), got him off the hook if he only return to court—sober—the following Monday. But it was only Saturday and Ebby had terrible shakes. Here is a quote from his 1954 talk at Dallas: "Once home, I remembered I had three cold

A Teleservice Volunteer's Experience

What a gift it was for me to receive a 12 Step call on my Tuesday night after-hours Central Office commitment. It was April 2nd, 2014, I had just returned home from a month away. I was busy unpacking when the call came into my cell phone. It was 12:30a.m. and it was Edward, 44 years old, from Fresno.

Edward told me that he just needed someone to talk to so he wouldn't go to the 7/11 store for more beer. He had been drinking non-stop since Friday, a 5 day binge. He so wanted not to drink. He said he knew he was an alcoholic. He had 3 D.U.I.s and had stopped drinking for 8 years by going to the D.U.I. school, but he never tried AA. He said he had been irritable and short-tempered. Then, when he had an hernia operation and was given Vicodin, it sent him back to drinking. He hasn't been able to stay stopped since he started back drinking again Dec. 16th.

I was able to share with Edward about AA and how it helped me to stop drinking a day at a time, after 26 years of daily drinking. I was so happy to share with him the suggestions which were given to me 19 years ago. After we spoke for 32 minutes, he promised he would go to an AA meeting that day. He had found us by goggling AA hot-line and he also found meetings in his area. He called back at 6:29 a.m. letting me know he had made it through the last 6 hours without drinking by asking for God's help. He called again before the end of my shift at 8:46 a.m. telling me what a miracle it was that after dropping his 4 girls off at school, he didn't stop for beer. He sells insurance from home and would always pick up beer after dropping them off. He also told me he contacted the Fresno AA office and a man was going to pick him up for his 1st AA meeting, and later that day, he told me the man is now his sponsor. That was such a high for me! Edward had hope and a solution.

I spoke to Edward five days later. He was so happy I called. He said, "I have 6 days today". I could hear the joy in his voice. He said his eldest daughter asked him, "Daddy, why are you so happy?" I can't tell how much joy I feel for being able to be a part of this happy story. It was such a gift!

The Teleservice program can still use more volunteers.

AA's Responsibility Pledge: I am responsible. When Anyone, Anywhere reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there. And for that: I am responsible... and that is the gift that keeps on giving.

(Today, April, 14th, Edward has 13 days and his wife and children are happy. He has more time for his children now. He says he doesn't want to forget the pain he was in the night he called, Apr 1st. He says he knows he has to go to meetings and do this, "One Day at a Time." We are both grateful for AA.)



STEP 5

"Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs."

This step was the beginning of what has become, and becoming more so, my "sweet" life. As I write this I am filled with gratitude. Thankful to have met this, my first contrary action. After discloser and discussion with my sponsor relief and pace followed. I soon adopted a new strategy to relieve my regret and guilt. I now try to "drop the rock" and practice acceptance. I feel much better when I am here. This new strategy is not automatic yet but can be summoned. This "tool" (acceptance) is a present from Step 5.

Writing/preparing my 5th step to share with another was important to the process. The writing provided a reference to refer as I shared and it has also served me upon reflection. I feel my ability to stay sober has been increased by admitting (and writing) my wrongs and sharing them with another. By being entirely honest and forthcoming I shed many fears, lost some ego, and gained humility.

Sharing my disturbing, embarrassing, and dark secrets with another delivered me from my self-made cage. I feel safe from the need to drink. Honestly admitting my wrongs, to God, myself, and my sponsor has taken away my pain and allowed me to see my defective thinking. I was now able to "look the world in the eye and be alone at perfect peace and ease".

This powerful step was the preface to a true kinship with God and man. A safe feeling remains. God will always forgive, accept and love me no matter what I've done. Because I have willingly exposed my wrongs I find I am less judgmental of others. I am more tolerant. (Another present).

I am no longer isolated. I feel forgiven and understood. I hide no more. Thank you AA and Step 5.

Concept Five

Throughout our world service structure, a traditional "Right of Appeal" ought to prevail, thus assuring us that minority opinion will be heard and that petitions for the redress of personal grievances will be carefully considered.

What this means in simple terms is that any **ONE** person can ask to be heard at the General Service Conference (GSC) and present an objection or petition to be heard on any issue. In Tradition Two, it states "our leaders are but trusted servants", so this Concept insures that all will be heard; our Trustees and the 100 or so General Service employees must uphold this Concept.


This would also prevail at the meeting level when our groups have the periodic 'business meeting'; that the minority opinion is always heard and considered, fully discussed, tabled and/or voted on several times, if necessary. In the GSC Charter's Third Legacy, it states that "unless the majority candidate can poll a two-thirds vote of his State or Provincial Assembly, he must place his name in a hat with one or more of the choices of the Assembly minority. By thus drawing lots, the minority candidates have an equal chance with the majority's choice". I am learning that the Concepts can gear down to guide what we do in our respective meetings, that all can be heard whether our "long timers" or majorities agree or not, the Group Conscience can serve to insure a "Right of Appeal/Petition" for our members.



The drunken monkey hypothesis proposes that human attraction to ethanol may have a genetic basis due to the high dependence of the primate ancestor of *Homo sapiens* on fruit as a food source. Ethanol naturally occurs in ripe and overripe fruit and consequently early primates developed a genetically based attraction to the substance. This hypothesis was originally proposed by Dr. Robert Dudley of the University of California at Berkeley and was the subject of a symposium at the meeting of the Society for Integrative and Comparative Biology. Dudley believes that while most addictive substances have a relatively short history of use, ethanol attraction may have a long evolutionarily based history. He believes that fruit ethanol may have been a significant source of energy and that the smell of the ripening fruit would help primates locate it. Ethanol is a relatively light molecule and diffuses rapidly in a natural environment. Primates are known to have a higher olfactory sensitivity to alcohol than other mammals. The oncebeneficial attraction to ethanol may underlie human tendencies for alcohol use and alcohol abuse.


