**Message from the Manager:** The month of June marks our fiscal year end. There will be many projects, including a complete count of our inventory while the office is closed the last weekend of the month (volunteers are welcome to assist, and pizza will be served for lunch), creating a budget for the next year, as well as reflecting to the Fellowship our state of the office to date. As a non-profit it is important for us to serve the Fellowship if any excess funds come to us, as we did in 2015 giving away 1500 Big Books when the International Women's Conference generously donated a large sum to the office. This last year has not been as lucrative as many years in the past. Our 2017-18 budget projected to have a modest deficit, but preliminary figures reflect a much larger loss this year to date. I will report on the final budget projections next month. The summer months are upon us, and volunteer positions are available every other weekend (10:00 AM-2:00 PM), every Friday morning (9:00 AM-1:00 PM) as well as every other Friday evening (5:00 PM-8:00 PM). It has been a consideration to close on Friday evenings, at least for the summer, but I have not made that decision as yet. If any of you have any feedback on the benefits of being open on Friday evenings, please let me know because it is a position that is not easy to fill, and very few customers come in.

## Step Six

### ***Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.***

Having done the 4th and 5th steps I did discover that I was actually my own worst enemy. I was ready to have those bad things removed that were causing me so many problems and was ready to do this simple sounding sixth step. My sponsor gave me a list of character defects and I think I was in shock. I couldn't possibly have all those. Yet, as I went through the list to check off those that belonged to me, I recognized that if I answered yes or no to each one, there may not be any nos. She reassured me that I may not have all of them or not all to the same degree. So, armed with a certain amount of comfort, I went through the list and I was able to admit to having nearly all of those defects.

To be honest though, I have to say that many of those defects in my character I admitted to, I thought were only very slight defects. Then in A.A.'s book Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions p.68, I read "it seems plain that few of us can quickly or easily become ready to aim at spiritual and moral perfection; we want to settle for only as much perfection as will get us by in life...So the difference between "the boys and the men" (or "the girls and the women") is the difference between striving for a self-determined objective and for the perfect objective which is of God."

It seemed that I might be settling for only as much as will get me by. I knew that for my sobriety, that was not enough. But in rereading I did find a solution from The 12 and 12 p.65, "Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character" - is A.A.'s way of stating the best possible attitude one can take in order to make a beginning on this lifetime job." The keys are my attitude and to remember that this is a lifelong process. Often I am finding that with character defects as with other things, 'more will be revealed'. Being willing and having made a beginning, I go forward 'one day at a time'.

After the tears and laughter of the fifth step came the hugs and more instruction. "Follow the direction on step six in the book, read the 12&12 on step six, and live in six and seven for a while."

With relief I went home to follow the plan. On the way, it seemed like a good idea to do some shopping, or to make a phone call, or stop to see a friend.... My "old ideas" were loudly whispering "Run!"

That time I went straight home and spent time in reflection of the goodness of a Creator filling me again with hope and light and a desire to do what would be His plan for me. It had become exceedingly obvious that my own ways of acting and thinking had not produced the results I thought they would. Once again willing to live emotionally in the utter defeat of my alcoholism followed by a committed surrender to seek and do His will, I began to live again on a new premise. With God as my director, the quiet voice within would suggest I do something.

Here was the real measure of my willingness. Did I do it, stuff it, or talk about it? I had often heard "tell on yourself" with reference to doing "behaviors", but now I understood the power of telling on myself about my ideas, thoughts, and plans. In fact as I learned to run these past someone whose judgment I trusted more than my own I acted better and felt better. I began to have some integrity; my actions and my feelings began to match. It was "a brand new venture into open-mindedness." (12&12, p68.)

When something came up I really didn't want to change, I had been instructed to "pray for the willingness to be willing to be willing to be willing." Usually that worked... eventually.

Today, the simple directions work just as they did the first time I used them. And today the step has endless applications in my life. I continue to find that staying close to other recovering alcoholics works as a mirror and reminder that alone I am deluded that my ideas work. With close friends in Alcoholics Anonymous as God's emissaries of living the steps I am able to continue to grow "until they put the tag on my toe" in happy, useful sobriety..

We thought we could transform the world with our success. It was put to the test by our A.A. forefathers and they found it didn't work. It took away from our primary purpose and confused people as to what A.A. actually was. Was it a business, was it political, medical, spiritual, educational or just another run-of-the-mill cults?


This tradition divides the spiritual from the material. We have learned that A.A. should always remain poor. We can't afford the distractions of wealth and all that comes with it, including ego. As the saying goes: Money is the root of all evil.

Bill W. said it best in this excerpt from the A.A. Grapevine of May 1948: We don't need money. The core of our A.A. procedure is one alcoholic talking to another, whether that be sitting on a curbstone, in a home, or at a meeting. It's the message, not the place; it's the talk, not the alms. That does our work. Just places to meet and talk, that's about all A.A. needs. Beyond these, a few small offices, a few secretaries at their desks, a few dollars a piece a year, easily met by voluntary contributions. Trivial indeed, our expenses!

Our history is our greatest asset. We all arrived at the doors of A.A., with a heavy list of tried steps that did not work. In A.A. we find a simple list of 12 steps, traditions, concepts and promises that do work. We will not regret the past nor wish to shut the door on it.

## Concept Six

***On behalf of AA as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of our world services and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous.***

The General Service Conference and the Trustees are organized very much like a modern corporate structure. It is necessary to have qualified and dedicated people to maintain AA's Twelve Traditions at a global level. The reason the corporate model was chosen is because it has proven to be the most effective in matters of policy, business and finance.

One of the reasons that the Conference exists is because individual groups would not be able to manage it on their own, unless they are willing to spend a great deal of time and responsibility on the matters at hand. Anyone who has ever been to a business meeting or steering committee meeting knows that the process is sometimes slow and awkward; that combined with the fact that a lot of us don't really have a concept of global perception.

It is important, however, to carefully consider how much authority and responsibility must be granted. It is not only for the direction they choose today, but how that will impact the future integrity of AA throughout the world. It is very important that the Trustees clearly demonstrate professional and financial skills that will ensure that we are capable of true present and future leadership.

The decision to appoint Trustees is based on a great deal of experience. This is important; matters affecting us on this level can not be made by people who do not have a full understanding of the groups Statement of Purpose. Again, this is not only important for today, but also to maintain the structural integrity so that alcoholics seeking recovery in the future may share the singleness of purpose that we have.

We all know that it is important to grow and change. This is true not just on a personal level. In the present, we have the ability and the responsibility to ensure that the organization of Alcoholics Anonymous not only endures, but continues to grow and thrive. That is the responsibility we have to the alcoholic who still suffers. And to do this we need dedicated, experienced people doing the kind of service which is required.
