#### Step Ten

# Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.

I remember when I first read **Step 10 – Continued to take personal inventory, and when we were wrong promptly admitted it** – I didn't really think much about it. I always promptly admitted when I was wrong when I was out there drinking. I had no problem saying I was sorry...time after time, I would say, "I'm so sorry, I was drunk." In fact, that one sentence seemed to be my stock apology to many, many people.

What I realized after I got sober and had begun working the steps, was that Step 10 wasn't just about saying I was sorry after I had done something wrong or if I had hurt someone, but rather *changing* the behavior so I wouldn't have to apologize. This is where a continuous personal inventory became so important in my sobriety.

Step 10 is a two-fold, maintenance step; just as it says on page 85 of *The Big Book*, "What we really have is a daily reprieve contingent on the maintenance of our spiritual condition." Step 10 allows me to keep my side of the street clean and all I can really do is strive to keep it clean on a daily basis. When old behavior creeps in (because it does), doing a daily inventory affords me an invaluable opportunity to find out why it's rearing its ugly head and to deal with it accordingly. Additionally, my daily inventory acts as a kind of spiritual barometer for me. If I snap at someone at work, then that is when my spot-check inventory comes in handy. When I give myself that brief moment to "pause when agitated or doubtful," then I'll know I must make amends promptly...not allowing the potential negative situation to get worse.

Step 10 is an important and essential tool in my sobriety...one of the *many* that AA has laid at my feet.

#### **Concept Ten**

#### **Tradition Ten**

Tradition Ten, like all our traditions, is an important tradition and concentrates on the purity of A.A. As long as we respect these traditions, Alcoholics Anonymous can remain intact and pure to its primary purpose and continue to have a message carried to alcoholics who suffer in and out of the fellowship.

We should be proud that we (A.A. as a whole) have never allowed ourselves to be divided by any major issue that the world has presented. In doing some research for this project, I learned more about a group called the Washingtonians. Their first vision was to be an organization of alcoholics who helped one another stay sober. And they were just that for a while. Their membership grew to over one hundred thousand members in the early 1900's. But, they allowed influential people, who weren't all alcoholic, to use their society for their own reasons. Because of this, they basically got sidetracked and their attention was diverted from staying in the solution to the disease of alcoholism.

Fortunately for us, people in early A.A. history, learned from the Washingtonians. They decided, and have taken the appropriate action, to stay out of public controversy by creating our tenth tradition. Because A.A. continues to be the number one most effective influence on my life and keeping me sober, I take personal responsibility to make sure I leave my opinion on outside issues away from sponsorship and the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous and pray that all others do too. This has to do with tradition one and our common welfare. Our recovery depends on us sticking together with the same vision in keeping A.A. pure.

- 6. That feeling of uselessness and self-pity will deepen.
- 7. We will gain interest in selfish things and lose interest in our fellows.
- 8. Self esteem will slip away.
- 9. Our whole attitude and outlook upon life will SUCK.
- 10. Fear of people, and of economic insecurity will multiply.
- 11. We will intuitively know how to run from situations, which never used to bother us.
- 12. We will suddenly realize that God would never have done to us what we are doing to ourselves.

Are these extravagant promises? We think not! They are being fulfilled amongst us every day--sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly. They will ALWAYS materialize if we continue to drink.

#### **NEWCOMER IMPRESSIONS OF AA**

(What should I do—or not do!)

Using the same sort of foul language that I used as a thirteen-year-old to impress my parents that I have finally *grown-up*, leaves the newcomer with the impression that I am too immature or slow-witted to be taken seriously. (psychologists call this attention-grabbing technique: "**shockers**")

If I mock the Twelve Steps during the reading of chapter Five (*What's the point? Balk-balk*, *Ha! Ha!* etc.) I am likely to leave the newcomer with the impression that the AA Twelve Step program is not to be taken seriously. The "Ha-Ha" may also come from seasoned members, just to be polite, although they may consider this "AA virus" as a crashing bore.

It feels good to share "let it all hang out," at discussion meetings. However, if I do not share how the Twelve Steps are working in my daily life (My experience, strength, and hope), I leave the impression that AA is limited to a group-therapy solution. Bill Wilson wrote: "Sobriety—freedom from alcohol—through the teaching and practice of the Twelve Steps, is the sole purpose of an A.A. group." \* Group therapy is good, so far as it goes, but AA is better than that! We have a Twelve Step solution that really works.

If I spend my time during the important "meeting after the meeting" with my regular friends, but ignore the newcomer, I am apt to leave them with a negative impression of AA—they came in lonely and left lonely. A less-than-welcome reception may cause their first AA meeting to be their last AA meeting. I need to have AA literature ready for them with a robust welcome before they dash out the door.

I need to better maintain a neat appearance at meetings—something I am not always so good at! A general conception is that AA is comprised of skid row bums. Newcomers are happily impressed to find this is not so. After all, if I am to be trudging the road of happy destiny, shouldn't I be dressed for the occasion?

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

#### HOW OXFORD GROUP CRITICISM SPAWNED THE TWELVE STEPS.

Bill and Lois Wilson attended the NY Oxford Group shortly after Bill was released from Towns hospital late December 1934. All went well till Oxford Group members criticized them for having private meetings for "drunks only" in their home at 182 Clinton street in Brooklyn Hts. They were considered as "not maximum." (not fully complying with OG principles) Chaos developed! Consequently, during August of 1937, Bill and Lois stopped attending the Oxford Group meetings.

The yet unwritten AA program of action was now on its own in NY! Happily, the twenty-eight Main Principles (tenets) of the Oxford Group remained imbedded in the mind of the author-to be of our Big Book. Some of these tenets were accepted by Bill as helpful to alcoholics—these Are found on page xvi of the Big Book:


Moral inventory
Confession of personality defects
Restitution to those harmed
Helpfulness to others
Necessity of belief in and dependence upon God.


This later became a word-of-mouth six step program of action for the alcoholics—there were several versions of this but here is listed the version found on page 263 of our current Big Book:

- 1. Complete deflation.
- 2. Dependence and guidance from a Higher Power.
- 3. Moral inventory.
- 4. Confession.
- 5. Restitution.
- 6. Continued work with other alcoholics.

The six-step word-of-mouth program was expanded into Twelve Steps in December of 1938 (Pass it On, pages 197-198). How lucky for us that Bill was considered "not Maximum!" Certainly, a God-send for us all! Further evidence that that: "God moves in mysterious ways"!

#### THE TENTH STEP PROMISES

The Big Book offers an array of promises associated with each of the Twelve Steps, but for me, the rewards starting on the bottom of page 84 and continuing throughout that paragraph are, by far, the most vibrant and exciting – these are my favorites:

#### "And we have ceased fighting anything or anyone - even alcohol."

When I am living in the spirit of the Step Ten directions and resolutely turning my thoughts to someone I can help, I become much less reactionary with those who disagree with me. Being right, takes a back seat to developing a continuing friendly relationship. The first shot is not fired because the battle never begins.

#### "For by this time sanity will have returned."

I feel as though the word 'sanity' overflows from the first promise; if I am unable to differentiate the true from the false in the matter of drink, I am indeed suffering from *alcoholic insanity*. However, if I can see and act on the obvious truth in the matter of that next drink, I am living in a *sane* manner. The Big Book often uses the expression of *insanity* interchangeably with the phrase, '*mental obsession*.' Jim's Story (p. 37) is case in point.

#### "If tempted, we recoil as from a hot flame"

During the first sober year or so, drinking thoughts would spawn deep-seated horror. If I would – as is often suggested – *Think the drink through*, the dismal memory of those horrible hallucinations coming on, the music exuding from the walls, and the jail door slamming shut filled me with terror. The dread of being fired, once again, would come on strongly. But as time passed, I learned to stymie these unpleasant thoughts before they become solidified. Actually, I believe I have developed a reverse Pavlov in the matter of drink.

#### "It just comes! That is the miracle of it."

This miracle happened for me! Thoughts of drinking no longer exist in my emotional vocabulary. This marvelous "release" took place in my second year of sobriety and I have not been plagued by the mental obsession since—thank you God!


#### "Instead, the problem has been removed. It does not exist for us."

These two phrases probably represent the most important single promise in the Big Book: a release from the insanity of taking that first alcoholic drink! Of course, this exciting promise is obviously concerning the mental obsession before the first drink. I will never be an ex-alcoholic—just one shot and I am shot! We are not told that the problem (obsession) has been eradicated, destroyed or beamed to outer space. It simply promises that it has been *removed*. That Obsession/Allergy will forever lurk, just waiting for me to fall below a fit spiritual condition.

#### "That is how we react so long as we remain in a fit spiritual condition."

I have found that living in the spirit of Maintenance Steps Ten, Eleven and Twelve, to the best of my ability, I have remained close enough to a fit spiritual condition that I haven't had to drink since my very first meeting in 1975.
