Action without prayer is self-reliance. Prayer without action is begging.

"Fearless" means that I look at my fears and take them into account, not that I don't have any fears. I usually ask my HP for help at the beginning, and any time I get stuck, to overcome my fears.

"Moral inventory" means that this is an inventory of my values and how my values correspond to my actions.

Concept Five

Throughout our world service structure, a traditional "Right of Appeal" ought to prevail, thus assuring us that the minority opinion will be heard and that petitions for the redress of personal grievances will be carefully considered.

When the Group conscience has voted according to Tradition Two. that's the end of the discussion, right? Not in Alcoholics Anonymous if your Group is using the 12 Concepts. According to Bill Wilson's writings about our 12 Concepts "... it is also true that during a time of great disturbance the Group Conscience is not always the best possible guide, because temporarily, such an upset may prevent it from functioning efficiently or wisely." (Quoted from the 12 Concepts for World Service, page 23). So, we continue to listen.

Just last evening in my own Home Group's business meeting there was a vote on our latest "issue". (Bill Wilson's writings also suggest that Groups that have differences of opinion are some of our healthiest Groups as long as mutual respect is paramount.) The vote was overwhelming, yet our Chair asked the small minority if they wanted to further address the entire Group. It doesn't matter if the minority opinion is held by 49% or just one person. Their opinions matter. They may have new information to present that would change the opinions of a majority of the voting members. This simple act can remind us that our Group unity is more important than any decision we may make affecting only our Group. The spirit of this Concept allows the minority to bring up the subject again, and again, and again, as long as they have new information to present to the Group.

This Concept's principle protects Alcoholics Anonymous from both the "tyranny" of the majority as well as the minority.

So, go ahead bring it up in your Home Group – yours may be the voice that our Higher Power will be using to inform the Group conscience.

The bartender says, "I watched what you did and I don't understand why you pushed the first one away and drank the second one!" The drunk stated," I've been going to those AA Meetings, and they said WHATEVER YOU DO, DON'T TAKE THAT FIRST DRINK!!!".

Our founders are dead, Old-timers I thought would live forever have slipped out of the rooms arid are gone on to a bigger, brighter room where Bill arid Bob and countless others have taken up residency and set up the meeting place. The coffee pot perks endlessly, effortlessly. Warm hands reach out to clasp in fellowship, each new arrival. Donuts, perpetually oven fresh, are over there. Each person has brought their Big Book, miraculously as they knew it here on Earth - tear stained, coffee cup circles on the cover, dog eared, underlined notes and fragments tucked between pages still intact. They murmur about the alcoholics they left behind. Did they teach us well, those still in distant rooms? Did they teach us enough of the Traditions and Principals of Alcoholics Anonymous, and the value of Permanence? I know their final words were not to start changing AA the minute they were out of sight, out of mind.

I believe we were given a mandate by every Old-timer who touched our lives arid taught us what they knew about living sober. That we were to go forward into the tide of alcoholism and carry the message to the still suffering alcoholic, the message of how we have recovered from a seemingly hopeless state of mind and body, by God's grace and the 12 steps of Alcoholics Anonymous.

This letter is sent anonymously, but you will know my voice. I have sat next to you at meetings, been on my knees with you doing the 3rd step prayer, heard your fourth step, and listened to your triumphs and sorrows. I have given you a ride to a meeting, and bought you a meal, loaned you a dollar for the basket, answered the phone at 2am when you were scared. I've been to the funerals and to memorial services to make a "26". I've done these things because that's what we do, what was done selflessly for me.

Our founders are dead. Their works and deeds live in permanence. Not carved in stone, but in the hearts and minds of each one of us who hold Alcoholics Anonymous sacred. Change is what is put into the collection. The permanence of Alcoholics Anonymous is what sustains me.

My experience has been that it's not enough to just get into the middle of the AA lifeboat. I have to be doing something in the middle of the lifeboat . . . and I have to be vigilant for the people on the edge of the lifeboat that have their feet dangling in the water . . . the ones that are holding on to the lifelines with white knuckles but a smile on their face saying, "Oh, I'm fine. I'm just fine. Everything is fine."

(A friend of mine calls them "fringe-ers" --- 'cause they're on the fringe of AA)





Tradition Five

Each group has but one primary purpose - to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

According to the "Twelve and Twelve", the idea that it is "better to do one thing supremely well than many badly" is absolutely central to this tradition. We, as alcoholics, can find unity amongst each other to fulfill our new primary purpose in life. We are uniquely qualified to help other alcoholics, and do this supremely well!

When I was "12 stepped" by my supervisor, she told me her story and I quickly realized that, despite my contrary belief, there was actually someone in the world that understood me. I perceived a genuine desire to help rather than insulting accusations of being alcoholic I heard at the bar. Immediately, I saw in her, hope for myself. As I progressed in the program, I fell into the temptation to save the world with A.A. like it describes in the *Language of the Heart*. I was "badly" trying to do many things well. It took going through all 12 steps to realize that I was saved from the depths of my drinking to help other alcoholics, not to save the world. With the humility of being saved, and only living by the Grace of God, I could then fulfill my newfound primary purpose. I have to give it away to keep it.

Personally, this tradition keeps me grounded. I have found that, for me, my needs are met through sobriety, and when I focus on my sobriety, everything else falls into place. My life is beyond blessed today, even with the trials and tribulations that arise, because I am sober. To stay sober, I show up to meetings, share my experience, strength and hope and lend my hand out to any suffering alcoholic- regardless of time in the program. The funny thing is, I do not always realize when I am helping other alcoholics! I tend to over-share and typically feel like a lot of what comes out of my mouth in a meeting is nonsensical and naïve. However, sometimes a member will approach me and describe how something I shared helped them. I am always flabbergasted and humbled because that is clearly God working through me. In my service work to A.A, it is easy for me to see how I am helping other alcoholics, and it gives me some of the most profound joy I have ever experienced.

In my life outside of A.A., I can apply this tradition by considering what the primary purpose of anything is. Asking myself these questions provides me a comforting focus that I am on the right path. As an employee, my primary purpose is to produce quality work. As a daughter, a sister, and an aunt, my primary purpose is to be the best version of myself and to love my family unconditionally.

Sobriety has opened the door to an immensely fulfilling life, and I feel honored to be trusted with the task of helping other alcoholics.

Step Five

When I embarked on my fourth step I had no idea what I was getting myself into or how consuming it would be. I followed directions from my sponsor as outlined in the Big Book and agreed to let God guide me through the process. A humbling aspect that became very apparent from the writing was that I was carrying around a lot of what I would describe as 'Mind Baggage' which had over time really screwed me up.

For years I acted aloof as the bad thoughts raced through my head, telling me that everything was alright. My ego covered up the pain and impending calamity and to top it all off, my fear of being judged lead me away from accepting and admitting the truth.

As I continued writing out my forth step, reality set in and overwhelmed the delusion of what I thought my life was. The facade came down and I was exposed.

So what was I to do!!??!!

There was no way I was going to tell anyone about this! My thought process was, I'll just change my behavior and become a new person, God will understand, he knows what's up. I still had a problem though. I would have to continue to carry around all of that baggage in my head.

I decided from then on I would 'Engage in a manner of living that demands rigorous honesty.' So there I was, admitting to my sponsor the exact nature of my wrongs which quite simply derived from me being selfish, dishonest, self seeking and full of fear. I could now accept me for who I was and would become.

The weight was lifted, and I was relieved from the bondage of self. Now I simply do God's will and bask in the sunlight of the spirit.



The drunken monkey hypothesis proposes that human attraction to ethanol may have a genetic basis due to the high dependence of the primate ancestor of Homo sapiens on fruit as a food source. Ethanol naturally occurs in ripe and overripe fruit and consequently early primates developed a genetically based attraction to the substance.

This hypothesis was originally proposed by Dr. Robert Dudley of the University of California at Berkeley and was the subject of a symposium at the meeting of the Society for Integrative and Comparative Biology. Dudley believes that while most addictive substances have a relatively short history of use, ethanol attraction may have a long evolutionarily based history. He believes that fruit ethanol may have been a significant source of energy and that the smell of the ripening fruit would help primates locate it. Ethanol is a relatively light molecule and diffuses rapidly in a natural environment. Primates are known to have a higher olfactory sensitivity to alcohol than other mammals. The once-beneficial attraction to ethanol may underlie human tendencies for alcohol use and alcohol abuse. **WIKIPEDIA**
