
Tradition

Tradition Twelve

Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

In the *Language of the Heart*, Bill W wrote: "the Twelve Points of Tradition are little else than a specific application of the spirit of the Twelve Steps of recovery to our group life and to our relations with society in general" (page 94). Tradition Twelve builds on the spiritual aspect of anonymity referred to in the Eleventh Tradition and "[asks] us to give up personal desires for the common good" (Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, page 187). By remaining an anonymous member of Alcoholics Anonymous, I fulfill my role in safeguarding the program for future generations of recovering alcoholics. As described in our literature, the concept of anonymity was developed out of lessons learned by our early members, and out of fear for the budding society. Over time, it has grown into confidence that anonymity not only protects individual members, but A.A. as a whole.

Tradition Twelve and its "mood of humble anonymity" provides me an opportunity to set aside my own personality, and the personalities of others to better carry the message (The Language of the Heart, page 94). I am just another anonymous member. Within A.A., my personality often conflicts with the personalities of others. In meetings and in service work, I receive opportunities to deflate by ego by recognizing that I only know what I know. I can exercise a true humility by remaining right sized, doing my very best one step at a time and focusing on carrying *the* message of recovery as opposed to *my* message of recovery.

Outside of A.A. I can look for the primary purpose of any situation, whether it be the company I work for or a personal relationship and ask myself what I can do to fulfill that. With the new design for living, I can live an honest life and remain willing to learn whatever I can.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the Lifeline and its readers for allowing me to share my Tradition Study. Through our literature, conversations with other members and these articles, I have developed a new appreciation for our Traditions and experienced a significant amount of personal growth. Thank you for my sobriety. "The Twelve Points of Tradition would make us one with each other and whole with the world about us. Unity is our aim." (The Language of the Heart, page 94)



- 12. and the freedom of a happy life, instead of the bondage of an alcoholic obsession.


All this and more through AA, are we grateful enough? Gratitude will continue the miracle of your sobriety, I found that out.

Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these Steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.


"Freely you have received; freely give." This is the main thought that leads us to share the message to still-suffering alcoholics. Then we discover that there is so much more.



We begin to discover that the things that seem to be setbacks are often a part of the pathway to better things. We begin to practice love and tolerance not only with the newcomer, but in our meetings, and even in our families.

We discover a priceless reward of diligently working the twelve steps- being able to deal with life's situations and problems, big and small, that would have previously led to a drink.

But most noteworthy, her insightfully thorough puzzles, as is this one from November, can give us all pause to consider the depth of our understanding of the many important details of our Life-Sustaining Program of Recovery.

The Values I Learned as a Child

An All-Encompassing Spiritual Roadmap By Rick R.

As I navigate my way through the program of Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.), with only a limited education, but a desire to learn all I can about life as it unfolds, it occurs to me that most of the things that the program teaches me are things I've have been taught before. I learned the Ten Commandments in church. In the Boy Scouts, I learned that a scout is Trustworthy, Loyal, Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, Kind, Obedient, Cheerful, Thrifty, Brave, Clean, and Reverent. In sports I learned of Teamwork and of Disappointment. In kindergarten, I learned to play fair in the sand box, I also heard of the Golden Rule. These things have been around long before me and even before A.A; so, where did I go wrong? I, like most Alcoholics that come into the program, had a myriad of personal problems, and at first, I believed that those life issues including Marital, Legal, Economic, Physical, etc.; were the cause of my drinking the way I did. At that time, I was not experienced enough to understand the ins and outs of these things.

I am not sure that anyone can just drop what they have been conditioned to do, just because they quit drinking. There must be more to it than that. If at first, we are fortunate enough to envision the wonderful life we can experience as the result of fully embracing this program, we will first, want to clear up the wreckage of the past. This we can do by thoroughly going through the Steps in the spirit they were intended to be taken, being careful not to hold back anything. As we approach the twelfth step, we are introduced to the Saint Francis prayer in the 12&12. Francis was not a saint when he wrote this prayer, but he expresses that these virtues were the answer to all the misguided thinking of the past. Note that not one of his requests is for help with things that are of a selfish or material nature.

I am not affiliated with any religious organization, but I am not threatened by religious doctrines, and I agree with the statement on pg. 87 BB. "Be quick to see where religious people are right. Make use of what they offer". I am sometimes honored when a newer member of the program asks for some guidance and I will usually suggest that he/she write out this prayer in long hand, paste it on his/her mirror and read it every day for a minimum of 30 days, and I guarantee that it will influence your thinking for the rest of your life. It did for me. I do not know of a more practical thing to set the tone for a person's interactions with others.

Thinking back on it, I always knew the right thing to do, but was not always strong enough to do it. I dismissed these things, not realizing the pain that would result as I lost my direction in life. The Saint Francis prayer is one of the ways in which the program suggests we revisit our early value system. It gives us a spiritual direction that deals with the change in our inner self, which, if we heal in that area, the material world will take care of itself. When faced with a sticky situation, I have a choice whether to escalate it or to back off and withdraw with love and understanding. After years of trying my best to live in the spirit of this prayer, it occurred to me that, as the result, I qualify in all those things I learned as a child, in church, in the Boy Scouts, in Kindergarten, The Golden Rule, and in childhood sports. To me, it is an ALL-ENCOMPASSING SPIRITUAL roadmap.


Concept Twelve

The Conference shall observe the spirit of A.A. tradition, taking care that it never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds and reserve be its prudent financial principle; that it place none of its members in a position of unqualified authority over others; that it reach all important decisions by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that its actions never be personally punitive nor an incitement to public controversy; that it never perform acts of government; that, like the Society it serves, it will always remain democratic in thought and action.

Concept 12 is a very important concept for World Service. It consists of the 6 General Warranties of the General Service Conference. These Warranties ensure that the Conference stays "right sized" and focused on the fellowship it serves. Concept 12, like the other concepts, is spiritually based, but its focus is describing the relationship between the various service entities and how they work together.


Basically, Concept 12 states that the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition, being ever mindful that the conference never become too wealthy or too powerful. This is accomplished by the various Warranties. Warranty 1 follows the guidelines laid down by the 7th tradition, and also limits individual member's donations to achieve that goal. Warranty 2 stipulates that sufficient operating funds, plus one full year's operating expenses of the G.S.O. and the Grapevine, shall be its reserve fund. The remaining warranties ensure that no one person be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others, that all important decisions be reached by a vote, and that the conference stays out of public controversy. Of all the concepts, concept 12 and its warranties can only be changed by written consent of three-fourths of all A.A. Groups in the world. Bill Wilson had the infinite wisdom to set these warranties "in stone" to ensure that Conference holds fast to the movement it serves.


