Concept Five

Throughout our world service structure, a traditional "Right of Appeal" ought to prevail, thus assuring us that the minority opinion will be heard and that petitions for the redress of personal grievances will be carefully considered.

Unlike many organizations, corporations, and governments, the A.A. service structure was uniquely designed to allow for the "Right of Appeal," "Petition," and "Minority Opinion." These ideas ensure the protection as well as making the best possible use of the minority feeling and opinion. In Alcoholic Anonymous, individual freedom is of enormous importance. A.A. allows an individual to declare themselves a member without forcing that individual to believe anything or pay anything. Furthermore, the ideas embodied in Concept Five ensure the well-heard minority will protect A.A. as whole against uninformed, misinformed, hasty or angry majority.

It is important to remember that although Tradition Two states the group conscience is the final authority for A.A. world service, Concept Five provides guidelines for the "trusted servants" of A.A. world service where obtaining the group conscience would not be practical and has limitations in responding to immediate problems and/or service matters. Consequently the "servants" have been entrusted and therefore are bound to use their own information and judgment, sometimes to the point of disagreeing with uninformed or biased group opinion. However, Concept Five still provides the ability to make concessions to the feelings and often-demonstrated wisdom of minorities. In doing so, A.A. occasionally may deny democracy's cherished principle of final decision by a simple majority vote.

In conclusion, Concept Five ensures that Alcoholics Anonymous will always be protected from the tyranny of either the majority or the minority opinion. By so defining theses relations, Concept Five ensures that the informed decision will be made at all levels to protect A.A. as a whole.


Our founders are dead, Old-timers I thought would live forever have slipped out of the rooms arid are gone on to a bigger, brighter room where Bill arid Bob and countless others have taken up residency and set up the meeting place. The coffee pot perks endlessly, effortlessly. Warm hands reach out to clasp in fellowship, each new arrival. Donuts, perpetually oven fresh, are over there. Each person has brought their Big Book, miraculously as they knew it here on Earth - tear stained, coffee cup circles on the cover, dog eared, underlined notes and fragments tucked between pages still intact. They murmur about the alcoholics they left behind. Did they teach us well, those still in distant rooms? Did they teach us enough of the Traditions and Principals of Alcoholics Anonymous, and the value of Permanence? I know their final words were not to start changing AA the minute they were out of sight, out of mind.

I believe we were given a mandate by every Old-timer who touched our lives arid taught us what they knew about living sober. That we were to go forward into the tide of alcoholism and carry the message to the still suffering alcoholic, the message of how we have recovered from a seemingly hopeless state of mind and body, by God's grace and the 12 steps of Alcoholics Anonymous.

This letter is sent anonymously, but you will know my voice. I have sat next to you at meetings, been on my knees with you doing the 3rd step prayer, heard your fourth step, and listened to your triumphs and sorrows. I have given you a ride to a meeting, and bought you a meal, loaned you a dollar for the basket, answered the phone at 2am when you were scared. I've been to the funerals and to memorial services to make a "26". I've done these things because that's what we do, what was done selflessly for me.

Our founders are dead. Their works and deeds live in permanence. Not carved in stone, but in the hearts and minds of each one of us who hold Alcoholics Anonymous sacred. Change is what is put into the collection. The permanence of Alcoholics Anonymous is what sustains me.

Peace of Mind and a Quiet Heart What More Could a Person Want

In my early days of sobriety, I was hearing a lot of words that were unfamiliar to me and I did not pay much attention to them at the time since I had bigger fish to fry. I had a drinking problem and everything else took a back seat to that. I was overwhelmed by marital, legal, and economic problems. Words like love, patience, spirituality, and forgiveness were foreign to me and I did not see how they mattered when all I wanted to do was quit drinking. I stayed close to that group, and they started calling me *the fortunate one*. At the age of 28, I was the youngest one in that group. The rest of members in the group were over forty and it stayed that way for quite a while as drug problems had not evolved enough at the time (1969) to affect the influx of younger members. I felt like the elders of that group took a special interest in me and that endeared me to them in a special way.

I was always listening for the magic word that would inspire me and give me a purpose in life and one day it happened. Tears come to my eyes when I recall the memory of the gentle voice of an old farmer named Harlan. As he talked about all the trials and tribulations in the past, that he had endured, he explained how he had stumbled into A.A. and that all the answers were there, but he did not understand it until he had a goal to reach for, and the next words that came out of his mouth changed my life forever. He said, "ALL I WANT FROM LIFE IS <u>PEACE OF MIND AND A QUIET HEART."</u> The next thought that came to me was, what more could a person want? To this day, I still quote Harlan and credit him with the inspiration. He passed away in 2007 being sober 51 years.

I have been through the big book and the 12&12 many times and have made a slow but very purposeful attempt to rid my mind of all the tormenting memories and regrets of the past, and as I processed each one of them, the more I realize that *peace of mind* is the natural result 0f living by these principals. Clearing the wreckage of the past, and changing those behaviors that caused it, and practicing unselfish behaviors, with the help of seasoned veterans like Harlan, I move closer and closer to the promise: We will comprehend the word serenity and we will know peace.

My books are marked and hi-lighted over the years as I evolved through the step study meetings or checked out the references to the big book in the Daily Reflections. Recently I have been focusing on the word *peace* and underlining it, and it is amazing how often it is linked to other words that, seem to get more attention. *Peace of mind encompasses the spirit of recovery in alcoholics anonymous* and I will be forever grateful that God saw fit to lead me to this wonderful program. *Harlan, rest in peace* and *thank you for the inspiration*.

Step Five: A Clean Slate
Those Tormenting Ghosts of Yesterday

We were all born with a clean slate. From the first day of our lives, we started to experience different emotions and those feelings had to do with the way we evolved into who we are today. Instinctively we responded to the different Threats and Comforts, of life, and these were the things that established our mental Strengths and Weaknesses. I believe, our problems can be traced back to the conditioning we experienced as we formed our Mental and Spiritual makeup. The perception we have of ourselves may be likened to a chalkboard containing every experience of our lives. If we can look at it and be satisfied that we had a good track-record, we would be comfortable with it and lead a normal life. If, however, we find ourselves on the negative side of the ledger in our formative years, we may develop abnormal feelings of guilt and shame, that triggers the beginning of the compulsion to drink excessively. In the beginning we get a temporary relief that tells us that we are fine, but it only lasts until we wake up the next morning and find ourselves in an even deeper quandary. We reach for the bottle, and again it gives us that temporary euphoria, and we repeat this process over and over until, something tragic in our lives drives us to Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) where we are encouraged to go through a process that can restore us to a more normal life. Steps One through Four are about surrender, acceptance, and discovery. Step five is about disclosure and for me, it was the gateway to how I was to live the rest of my life. After two attempts at Step Four, I was faced with the decision as to whether my future was going to be honest and meaningful, or just a meaningless facade. Fortunately, for me, I took a leap of faith and disclosed all those, so called, tormenting ghosts of yesterday, (12&12 pg.55) and looking back on it now, I realize that the decision to do this was the hinge pin for my thoroughness, with the rest of the steps. Had I not Cleaned the Slate at that time, I just do not see how I could have followed the spirit of truth and honesty, with myself and others that would have resulted in the peace of mind that I enjoy today. My inventory had to deal with bad, habits and deeds which had to be changed by the process suggested in steps six and seven. That was the easy part of step five. However, those tormenting ghosts of yesterday were another story. These were not habits, but deeds that I had done as an adolescent kid that seemed unforgivable. No one should ever know; I would take them to the grave with me. Mustering the strength to take that risk may have been the most crucial step forward I have ever made. My brain had been lying to me, after all; how bad could a thirteenyear-old kid be? That one decision is what I credit with giving me my life back and if I had not done it, I do not see how I could have given a good effort to the rest of the steps. I often hear members of the program that seem to resist looking deeper into their regrets and seem to build a wall of reasons why they do not need to, and I wonder if they might be caught up in the same dilemma that I was in when I took my fifth step. I wish I could reassure them that it is not worth the mental torment that it puts us through and that it may be wise to revisit that step and clean the slate. We cannot live alone with them; we must talk to someone about them. (Even A.A. old-timers, sober for years, often pay dearly for skimping this step. (12&12 pg. 56) If, you are that person, I encourage you to try to garner the strength to take that risk, and clean the slate; Afterall, we only live once. Let us not waste the opportunity to live a peaceful and contented life.

Tradition Five

Each group has but one primary purpose - to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

As individual alcoholics, we walk, bounce, stumble or crawl our way into the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous with a primary purpose. For many, it's to do something about our drinking. Sure, for some it's stipulated by some authority, even a spouse. But for lots of us it's to stop (or reduce, ever hear that one?) drinking because of something bad that has happened.


Luckily for us, the group we walk into doesn't have varied purposes. It has ONE primary purpose. That's what primary means: First, before all others. Sure, the group has autonomy and can control the style, format, place, time, length and flavor of the meeting. But it all serves the one primary purpose, to carry the message to alcoholics.

AA is so awesome that many other types of fellowships also use the steps (with permission) for their own primary purposes. For Alcoholics, it's alcohol that creates the suffering environment that culminates in us looking for help. So we look outside ourselves, demonstrating for the first time in a long time that we admit we cannot do it ourselves. We look to the AA group, often because we have nowhere else to go.

My personal favorite word in this step is "carry". Our group doesn't instruct, dictate, mandate, prescribe anything to the newcomer. We have a message and we carry it. It is up to the individual alcoholic to want what we have in order to get it. And we keep what we have by giving it to them. We carry the principles and steps in our daily lives in all our relationships, if we are lucky enough to do so. As sponsors, we share how we did it. As speakers we share our stories. At meetings, we share ourselves so that we can fulfill the primary purpose.

Many of the traditions are applicable to the individual alcoholic as well as the group. For me, this is one of them. I have to remember Tradition Five when I am dealing with someone who I dearly wish would "get it". I want to get them sober. I might even coerce other loved ones to do it my way and become intolerant to the continued drinking. But that's trying to deliver the message, not carry it. And when I read or write about this tradition I am reminded about why the groups exist in the first place. And because of one of those groups, I heard the message and I am still here. Were it not for that group and those AA's, perhaps I wouldn't be.

Step Five

Do you need a good reason for taking your 5th Step in Alcoholics Anonymous? After experiencing the first three Steps and finding some hope, and making it through that "solitary self-appraisal" known as our inventory, many alcoholics find it difficult to share their whole life story, finding all sorts of "easier methods" to avoid this humbling experience.

I found the best reason to be in our Big Book, "If we skip this vital Step, we may not overcome drinking". Having balked at the first four Steps, only to find myself returning to drinking and banging my fist on the bar, I kept coming back to meetings and finding more and more people were finding success in their sobriety by doing an inventory and sharing it with another alcoholic. After one more bout with booze, I finally did what I thought was a thorough and complete 4th Step, and promptly sat on it for a year and a half. During this time I separated from my wife and kids, and made another military move overseas. Amazingly, I found myself drinking again, terrified of where it would take me this time. I finally found someone I could trust, who had the freedom and serenity in his life I wanted, and took a 5th Step.

Since I wasn't anywhere I could call home, I went to a quiet location on the beach, and found the peace and serenity I was looking for. I still have it after almost 17 years, and encourage anyone balking at this Step to take it right away. I've heard it said, "You can never take these Steps to soon, but can wait too long", which is true for this one.







The drunken monkey hypothesis proposes that human attraction to ethanol may have a genetic basis due to the high dependence of the primate ancestor of Homo sapiens on fruit as a food source. Ethanol naturally occurs in ripe and overripe fruit and consequently early primates developed a genetically based attraction to the substance.

This hypothesis was originally proposed by Dr. Robert Dudley of the University of California at Berkeley and was the subject of a symposium at the meeting of the Society for Integrative and Comparative Biology. Dudley believes that while most addictive substances have a relatively short history of use, ethanol attraction may have a long evolutionarily based history. He believes that fruit ethanol may have been a significant source of energy and that the smell of the ripening fruit would help primates locate it. Ethanol is a relatively light molecule and diffuses rapidly in a natural environment. Primates are known to have a higher olfactory sensitivity to alcohol than other mammals. The once-beneficial attraction to ethanol may underlie human tendencies for alcohol use and alcohol abuse. **WIKIPEDIA**
