

The A.A. Moon Shot

I Admired Her Courage By Rick R.

I got sober on October 15, 1969, at a time when the Space programs were on the Television in black and white and I was up deep into the nights watching as it happened. About twenty years later I in a meeting when I heard a very young, very sincere, single mother of two, sharing that her first experience in the Alcoholics Anonymous program was the thought of having to do all this stuff for the rest of her life and she didn't find it too comforting. (Her words) It sounded to me that, from her perspective, she knew that she had to do it, but it wasn't going to be easy or fun. I admired her for her courage and conviction, and I tried to encourage her by explaining things that I had experienced when I was faced with the life changing challenges of sobriety. I was a father of a boy, I was in the Navy at the time, and I was divorced. It was a difficult time, but I had to go through it, drinking or not. I likened it to the first Apollo Space Mission to the moon. It goes something like this.

When you first see the size of the spacecraft and consider the amount of energy it would take to put it into space, it is hard to fathom. After the countdown is complete, the engines fire and a tremendous amount of flames and smoke engulf the entire area and, in a few moments, it slowly starts to lift off. As it lumbers its first hundred feet, it is expending a tremendous amount of fuel. Slowly it starts to gain momentum and pick up speed, still shuddering along. Soon the booster tanks are depleted, and they are ejected, and the main tanks begin to propel it further along the flight path with even more thrust as it is reaching for orbit. Next, the main tank is depleted just before orbit and is ejected. What is left is a very small portion of what arose from the launchpad. Soon the craft leaves orbit and heads towards the moon and something else happens that sometimes goes unnoticed. Someware between the earth and the moon, the gravitational pull of the moon has more influence on the craft than the gravity of the earths has, and it is gently drawn along its path. Very little energy is except for minor course corrections.

In Alcoholics Anonymous, when we first get started, it appears to be an insurmountable task that requires a tremendous amount of effort just to get off the launchpad. Not every launch is successful and some of us don't make it the first time, and we need to exert all that energy on each successful attempt. As we do get our way, it starts to get easier as we head for our objective. When we go through the twelve steps, we finally reach orbit.

After we are satisfied that everything is in order, we can now set out for the moon. If we stay on course, the spiritual gravity of values we have adopted in the A.A. program will far outweigh the negative gravity of the past as we eject all the dead weight that held us down. As we continue to adjust to the day-to-day mistakes that we make and adopt am unselfish approach to life, somewhere along the flight path, we will cross that line where we are drawn towards a life and serenity that is hard to imagine when we are setting on the launchpad. The most important part of the journey is the lift off. If we can get through that most difficult time, it does get easier, and then we need only to stay the course.

Step One

We admitted we were powerless over alcohol - that our lives had become unmanageable.

It is interesting that no matter how long I am around this program, I am constantly challenged. For example, when I first wrote out the line above, the first Step...where the dash is now I wrote "and". I thought I should look at the book and make sure I had written it correctly and there it is...there are two separate and distinct statements separated by a dash! We are admitting two distinct things about ourselves: 1. That we were powerless over alcohol and 2. That our lives had become unmanageable. When we take that first Step it actually is in the past tense; the implication is that now we have a chance, we have a chance to be "on the other side" of our addiction to alcohol by virtue of taking this first step and practicing these principles in all our affairs.

I recently attended a Workshop on Steps 1-2-3. In that workshop I learned, (I'm now 26 years sober), that there is a first step before Step 1; on page 30 in the Beautiful Big Book it says, "We learned that we had to fully concede to our innermost selves that we were alcoholics. This is the <u>first step</u> in recovery." I realize finally...I am a fully conceded alcoholic. "Slobriety" is the name of my game. I don't have to rush, I don't have to take this whole thing all at once; I keep coming back, one day at a time, and for this I am truly grateful.

When I came back after a slip, a guy said to me: 'I have information for you that might be difficult for you to hear. You are NOT going to stay sober on the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. You are one of those people that is going to have to use the PROGRAM of Alcoholics Anonymous.' --- then he offered to show me the difference.

My life is like one of those Jenga puzzles . . . I don't talk to my sponsor for awhile, so it's like taking out a piece of the puzzle and putting it to the side, then I cut back on meetings so I've taken out another piece of the puzzle and put it to the side . . . then I get to a place where my foundation is shaky and I don't know what else I can take out and put to the side without the whole thing following down around my ears!


I've learned that I can't always control my thoughts but today I don't have to let my thoughts control me.

Today I am grateful that I don't need to laugh at others . . . I have my own entertainment center sitting on my neck!



Tradition One

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity.

The long form of our first tradition states, "Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. AA must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward."

When I think of how big AA is today, I can be humbled in knowing that I'm only part of a very large community of alcoholics. It helps me to understand that - Albertine R. would say - "I'm not much much". I've come to believe, through my own experience and the experience of others before me, that there must be an AA group that exists for me to continue to live my life without alcohol. Yes, the program consists of the Twelve Steps as outlined in our Big Book, and our primary purpose is to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. But then one may ask, "Can this be done without a group?" Many can emphatically say "No! Not at all!" I'm convinced that if there's not a group for me to be part of, I'm doomed.

In my early sobriety, I attended a group where the leader had all sorts of rules, one being you had to say "My name is ____, and I'm an Alcoholic!". If you didn't follow the rules, and certainly didn't state you were an alcoholic, you had to leave. The leader had over ten years of sobriety and most everyone else was under six months. One night, I watched as several members of other AA groups came to a meeting and confronted the leader about her rules and violating the traditions. Though I'd been newly sober again, I clearly saw that many of the newcomers at the meeting were disturbed by what was happening. Controversy and rumors were rampant, and several members were getting involved at other meetings in the area. All of the activity within the group was lost, and the primary purpose of the group became secondary to everything else. Then the leader decided to quit the group, since her agenda wasn't being followed.

I went back to the meeting a few weeks later and found it was closed. I looked for a few AA friends in the area and found one was drunk again. It was scary to see what had just happened. I tried to help others with transportation to go to other meetings, but not having a group in the area was too much for some.

If I ever return to visit Okinawa, I plan to visit Camp Butler and see if another AA group is there. My hope is that a group does exist, and that the common welfare of the group is most important.

Understanding Step One

Sometimes We Pick the Fruit Before its Ripe By Rick R.

I wish I could say that everyone that enters the doors of AA has an equal shot at getting sober and staying that way for the rest of their lives but, depending on the different reasons why each individual decides to give AA a chance, coupled with the degree of desperation that caused that person to delve into what the program has to offer, we get a variety of different results. When I arrived at my first meeting, I was desperately looking for what I thought was a solution to an impossible situation. I was defeated and absolutely demoralized. Within minutes of being exposed to the sober members of that group I was convinced that I had found the solution to my hopeless condition and the desire to drink was removed from me on the spot and has never returned. That was on Oct. 15, 1969. I wish every new member could have that type of experience, but we know that many of us are not that receptive in the beginning. Most of the members of that early group were over forty years old and I was only 28 yrs. old but I was the exception at that time. Meetings were much smaller since there were no rehab facilities intervening in the alcoholic's drinking escapades, so they did not start hitting their bottom till their forties or fifties and it had something to do with midlife crisis or was that just a coincidence. What I do see that is different from my experience is the blurred line when comes to the first requirement for AA membership: "a desire to stop drinking." or employer told me that I had to stop drinking, considering the relief I got from the bottle, I doubt that I would have been as receptive to getting sober, and if I had, I am sure I would have relapses as much as any of those who, unfortunately, struggle with staying sober. It appears that many of the AA members of today have seen a high percentage of relapses and they attribute that as an abysmal success ratio in AA, but they assume that just because they were sent to AA, from a rehab facility that they should be lumped in with those, like me, who had a desire to stop drinking and came in looking for answers. These relapses are the natural result when the desire to drink is stronger than the desire to stay sober. In the Foreword to the second edition of the Big Book it says: Of alcoholics who came to AA, and really tried, 50% got sober at once and remained that way: 25% sobered up after some relapses. I often ask a newcomer what caused them to give AA a visit and most of them say that the main reasons were DUI's, Work related requirements, and spouse's ultimatums. Occasionally someone says, "I just ran out of ideas, and I need help". The latter is usually the

Occasionally someone says, "I just ran out of ideas, and I need help". The latter is usually the one in ten that stays sober without relapse. I also believe that if you counted only the ones that came in searching for answers, the same ratio as in the foreword to the Big Book would still apply. Seventy five percent is not bad. The good news is that many of the members that are here as the result of intervention or other motivations often become what they refer to as the "educational variety" often get sober years before they would have had they not been intervened upon. We treat these brothers and sisters with empathy, compassion and understanding. The awareness in the community has taken away much of the stigma (not all) of being cursed with the disease of alcoholism and where we had meetings totaling ten or twelve members, we now have twenty to forty members attending. Sometimes the fruit gets picked before it is ripe, but it is never discarded.

(The Concepts stated here are in the short form.)


Concept One


Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole fellowship.


