Concept Three

To insure effective leadership, we should endow each element of A.A. - the Conference, the General Service Board and its service corporations, staffs, committees, and executives - with a traditional Right of Decision."

For all levels of service from groups up to World Services, the authority and ability to make decisions in each position is found in Concept Three. We elect GSR's, Committee Members and Delegates whom we feel will make well-informed decisions on behalf of those they serve while upholding the Twelve Traditions which bind Alcoholics Anonymous together and adhering to the Twelve Concepts.

It HAS been my experience that this concept relates to Tradition Two. Within Tradition Two, we speak of trusted servants who do not govern. Not every decision must be taken back to the group each and every time an issue is voted on. Therefore, we elect those we think possess a decision-making ability sufficient to serve us effectively. We trust these leaders to decide how to handle group dealings and when to bring a matter back to the groups for discussion and resolution.

When I was in my first year of service, I became the GSR for two groups. Within the District I was of service, an issue of how to handle drug addicts sharing solely about their drug history in meetings was taken back to the group. One group I represented had no problem with it at all and in fact, did not discourage that type of sharing within their meetings. The other group that I represented as GSR held a strong belief in the Traditions and did not allow 'drug-a-log' sharing. I being an alcoholic who experimented very little with drugs and found them rather lacking then stuck merely to alcohol throughout my drinking career had my own view of how the issue should be handled. At the next GSR meeting I, being very new in service, did not realize that one cannot vote for two groups simultaneously and consequently my decision making abilities had been compromised due to the two groups I was representing having conflicted ideas on an issue while having my own view on the matter at hand. It was a lesson learned and a mistake I will not repeat.

Many Districts and groups have by-laws that they have established through a group conscience, though they cannot anticipate everything that will happen within their fellowship. Similarly, life cannot be dictated by an instruction manual. So we trust each other, a God of our understanding as He may express Himself in our group conscience and those we elect to represent us, meanwhile remembering that we are merely humans trying to have a spiritual experience while stumbling through this thing called life.





Step Three

Made a decision to turn our life and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.

If this "God talk" is making you squirm, here's the really good news...this step lets you off the hook and removes the pressure. I discovered the word "God" was just an umbrella word covering things like universe, nature, spirit, entity, higher power, the fellowship of AA, or whatever I wanted "it" to be. My sponsor had me write a classified ad "Sober Woman looking for God of her understanding and must have the following:" (then fill in whatever you want).

"The wording was, of course, quite optional so long as we expressed the idea, voicing it without reservation." (Big Book pg 63). It was important at this juncture to just understand I needed to believe that *some power greater than me was in charge*.

My sponsor used to say that I have nothing to lose to work this step because God certainly couldn't make a bigger mess of things than I already had. She reminded me all I had to do was "Make a decision..." it was that simple. She had me create a "God Box" to put all my resentments, dilemmas, problems, and decisions in. Over time, that shoe box suddenly turned into a God drawer, which turned into a God trunk, which 15 years later is a God Storage Unit. All I had to do was be willing. This step lists the words "will, willing, willpower, willingness" 24 times (yes, she had me count them one day when I was whining about something). This would be my first attempt at learning about faith and how "well and earnestly I have tried to come to a decision. In the beginning, even the smallest amount of willingness is all that is needed...to open the door ever so slightly."

I was one of those they write about in the 12 X 12, Step 3 (pg. 39) that was soon "convinced that" I had "more problems than alcohol"...and my life was unmanageable even though I was sober. I was desperately unhappy...victimized by remorse....guilt over yesterday...bitterness...envy or hatred...and panic takes over...and my lone courage and unaided will cannot do it. Surely I must now depend upon Somebody or Something else." This thinking was killing me, and my sponsor said I would probably be in a lot less pain if I tried to give up the hope of a better past.

I was always waiting for the other shoe to drop, and she reminded me that God doesn't wear shoes. Self-sufficiency wasn't paying off, and I discovered I couldn't fix self will with self will. And every time I'd go to her in yet another meltdown from my will, she'd casually say, "And how's that working out for you dear?" The pattern I saw - if I knew the beginning, middle and end of a plan or story - was probably my will. If I just knew just the beginning of the plan or story, it was probably God's will.

"This was only a beginning, though if honestly and humbly made, an effect, sometimes a very great one, was felt at once (Big Book Pg 63)."



At Six Years Old, The Die Was Cast

I Did Not Fit In. By Rick R.

When I look back on my experience, after going through my pre drinking years, my drinking years, and my sober years, in the AA program it is not hard to see what a troubled individual I was. In my days from birth to the day I entered grammar school I was unaware of the dysfunction in my immediate environment and with the absence of supervision, discipline, and role models, I did anything I wanted to do. And, as I later learned, my behavior became dishonest, selfish, and shameful.

On my first day of parochial school the world came apart for me when I looked around the classroom and realized that I did not fit in. All the other kids were having fun and enjoying that experience, and I was terrified. I knew that I could never live up to what was expected of me at that time. As a result, I developed fears and inhibitions that those other kids did not seem to have. I learned right from wrong in church but was much too insecure to do what was right. I learned to cut corners, to lie, and cheat, since I had no confidence that I could ever keep up with my peers. I began to overcompensate and to act out to make up for my short falls, but it never worked for me. Fist fighting became a regular event. This all went on till I turned thirteen and found the answer to all my problems. I had access to alcohol, and I did not recognize it at first, but it immediately removed all those fears and inhibitions and for the first time in my life I felt normal and that I was as good as anyone and better than most, so I thought. I continued to drink to feel good but when I awoke in the morning, I was more terrified than before and all I had to do was to take that first drink and everything was right with the world again. I continued this pattern until I was twenty-eight years old when I woke up one morning to face The Hideous Four Horsemen, Terror, Bewilderment, Frustration, Despair (Big Book pg. 151) and I had a moment of clarity. I knew that I had to do something about my drinking, or I would die a horrible death at the hands of others or by my own hand. I called AA, struggled to find the location of the meeting place. I arrived there two hours later, and was greeted by three members who were compassionate and understanding. They listened, my sense of isolation slowly went away, as did the desire to drink. I have never wanted a drink from that moment (Oct.15, 1969) to the present. I have never had to struggle with the AA program and have embraced it to the best of my understanding. I came to understand that the things that I experienced as a child and the actions I took as a practicing alcoholic, were the ingredients of the disease of Alcoholism. It became clear to me that, the die was cast at the age of six, and all the ingredients were there long before I ever took a drink. All I had to do was add the Alcohol. Once I removed the alcohol, all the ingredients were still there and that is what the program helped me to set it right. I was not responsible for becoming an Alcoholic, I am, however, accountable for my behavior while I was drinking, and if I am willing to make restitution and clean up the wreckage of the past, I can free myself from all the guilt and shame and walk away with my dignity and self respect. Today my life is better than it ever could have been, had I never become an Alcoholic in the first place, and, of that, I am convinced the I am "powerless over alcohol and my life has become unmanageable."

The path for me to any continuous length of sobriety has been long and has consisted of several relapses over the last 20 years. Each one became more incomprehensibly demoralizing than the last. They all took me further down the ladder of contemptible acts and behaviors. Had it not been for Tradition Three -- because of my overwhelming guilt and embarrassment - I might not have felt so compelled and welcome to return to AA once again.

But I always knew that this program, God and all of you were here waiting with loving, open-arms to see me take another 24 hour chip. I knew I would not be judged by you but accepted by you as a member of AA because I had the desire to stop drinking. I had the desire and I declared myself a member of Alcoholics Anonymous.

And then, the "miracle" happened! I finally honestly admitted I was an alcoholic, and my life was unmanageable. I let you embrace me, and I embraced you back for the first time. I followed your suggestions and became teachable. I also came to believe that a power greater than myself could restore me to sanity. Thus, I was blessed with having the obsessive compulsion to drink removed!

Because of God, this program and all of you, I will be celebrating 2 years of continuous sobriety in a couple of months! My life is now full of love, joy, and acceptance of life as it is and others as they are. I am so very grateful to AA and for Tradition Three that states that anyone may be a member of AA because they have a desire to stop drinking.


I am glad I have my Higher Power and the program of AA to guide me--there are times when it seems like everything is falling apart, when actually it's all falling together.


Anonymity: The Spiritual Foundation

We Failed Idealists Need Attention

I came from a family that was riddled with alcoholic drinkers and many of them had the problem as bad as I did. I recall the first month, or so, when I got sober, still hanging out with them at our favorite watering hole, drinking ginger ale. I would slip out every night at 8:00pm and go to the AA meeting at 8:30 pm and return at 10:30 pm without telling anyone where I was going. I didn't want anybody to know that I was checking out the AA program. I didn't want to face the ridicule at the time, and I wasn't sure it was going to work for me. If it didn't work, I wouldn't have put up with their mocking me. You might say that I was protecting my anonymity at the time and didn't even know it. After thirty days of that, I didn't care who knew about it because I believed I had found the answer, and I did. Soon after that I was one of those guys that wanted to shout it from the rooftops and try to sober up everyone around me and you know how that turned out. As I dragged each or my five brothers to AA meetings, it seems that they each learned just enough to be able to rationalize exactly why they were not alcoholics, and they ridiculed me anyway. Since then, one brother, a nephew, and a niece have committed suicide. That was among the experiences that gave me hard earned lessons on the respect for the principle of anonymity. Of the rest of my immediate family of ten siblings, only one sister saw something in me that she liked, and she got sober in the program and hasn't had a drink in over forty-eight years. We are exposed to the discussions in AA meeting as the newer members complain about someone breaking their anonymity, or the ones that want to shout it from the rooftops, like my former self, and that will always be the case in AA as that is one of the symptoms of alcoholism. We are failed idealists that need attention, but as we get more experience, we learn the true value of the spirit of anonymity. We can always come up with some noble reason for tooting our own horn and we can dress it up in the altruistic motive of sacrificing one's own anonymity to save someone's life and that, sometimes, in the long run, destroys the chance of being a good example and often turns out doing just the opposite, and I have personally witnessed that. Tradition Twelve talks of Anonymity as "The spiritual foundation of all our Traditions ever reminding us to place principles before personalities". There is a difference in the" Spirit of the law", and the" Letter of the law". We who have been diligent with the program have been highly influenced by the Spirit of what the founders learned and introduced us to in the form of the 12 steps and the 12 traditions, and they all come in the form of unselfishness of the spirit. I have yet to find one prayer or principle in the two books that we use as reference guides, that are of a material nature or of selfish motives. This tells me that the things I do, are the result of practicing the principles of the program should be done unselfishly and without fanfare. So long as I needed the attention that I was always seeking when I was looking for the photo opp., I was still only following the letter of the law, so to speak. When I came to understand the Spirit of Anonymity, I was able to rein in my EGO and my selfish motives. I try to be a good role model and do it quietly. It seems to work better that way.


