



At the Expense of Others

"I'm an alcoholic--and a drug addict."

"I have to say this--for me."

"I know this is a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous but. . ."

I used to think I *had* to share about my drug use. After all, AA teaches us to be rigorously honest, doesn't it? And as a younger person in AA, I was different than a lot of the older, "pure" alcoholics, wasn't I? Nobody is going to tell me what to say. Nobody did, either. (A couple of old-timers took me aside after the meetings to talk about this, but I dismissed them.)

One night, I was talking in the parking lot after a meeting of my home group. As the people cleared out, I realized there were just two of us left--myself and a newcomer. He was in his sixties. We got to talking and he actually seemed to be listening to me! I really felt amazed that a man old enough to be my grandfather would listen to me about anything, and especially about AA.

The meeting that night had been on Step One and many people, including me, recalled their use of drugs (some in great detail). This man and I began to talk about the meeting and then he dropped a bombshell on me. He didn't think he qualified to be an alcoholic because he hadn't used any drugs! Here was a man who drank for more years than I have been alive (most of them, by his account, alcoholically), yet he didn't feel like he belonged in AA. And we were supposedly talking about alcoholism!

Well, I sputtered and stammered for a while and I finally convinced him that the only requirement for membership was a desire to stop drinking and that there were no requirements for drug use involved. Thank God he is still sober. Later that night, I really began to question myself and the message I was carrying. Sure, it was important that I qualified and identified myself, but were the details worth it at the possible expense of others? I realized I should stick to alcohol and alcoholism in order to keep the door wide open, not make it more narrow. If even one person gets the wrong idea and feels they don't belong, that is one too many. Besides, I had been sober for a while and I knew what I was.

I guess I started to think just a little more about other people than I did about myself. So that's why some groups are so concerned about AA's singleness of purpose--some groups in my area even read a statement of singleness of purpose before their meetings. It isn't just to be tedious and nitpicky and to "bust chops," especially the chops of young people. It is so all alcoholics can feel that they belong once they get to AA.

The Fine Print

Pharmaceutical commercials have very long disclaimers. But alcoholic beverage ads just say: "Please drink responsibly." If alcohol ads had to follow the same guidelines as pharmaceutical ads, this might be their disclaimer:

Caution: Drinking alcohol may result in vomiting, nausea, indigestion, slurred speech, frequent urination (with pants up or down), memory loss, brain damage, impaired vision, headaches, delusions of grandeur, lying, divorce, unemployment, evictions, bankruptcy, black eyes, broken bones, concussions, bleeding ulcers, cirrhosis of the liver or death! Do not consume if you are allergic to alcohol. If these symptoms persist, call the AA hotline immediately!

Concept Six

Short Form

The Conference recognizes that the chief initiative and active responsibility in most world service matters should be exercised by the trustee members of the Conference acting as the General Service Board.

Long Form

"On behalf of A.A. as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of out world services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the general Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous".

We have seen that the "final responsibility and ultimate authority' for A.A.'s service activities rest with the A.A. groups (Concept 1), but to carry out this responsibility they must delegate to the Conference (Concept 2)). The Conference, in turn, must delegate administrative authority to the General Service Board of Trustees. Again, it is helpful if you are familiar with both the Conference Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board to understand this relationship and the freedom of action that the trustees must have.

The trustees have the legal and practical responsibility for the operation of A.A. World Services, Inc. (which embraces A.A. publishing as well as the General Services Office) and of the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. These entities have a combined cash flow of many millions of dollars annually. The trustees are also responsible for A.A.'s public information activities. They are the guardians of the Twelve Traditions. They are responsible for carrying the A.A. message to other countries around the world. They are A.A.'s "bankers", overseeing the financial operations and investing A.A.'s substantial Reserve Fund. (Read the text of Concept XI for a more detailed account of their functions.)

Bill makes the point that although "our objective is always a spiritual one," nevertheless our world service is a "large business operation," "Indeed," he says, "our whole service structure resembles that of a large corporation. The A.A. groups are the stockholders, the delegates represent them, like proxy holders, at the annual meeting; the General Service Board Trustees are actually the directors of a 'holding company,' And this holding company (the General Service Board) actually owns and controls the two 'subsidiaries' (A.A.W.S. and the A.A. Grapevine) which carry on the . . . services.

"This very real analogy makes it clear that, like any other board of directors, our trustees must be given large powers if they are to manage the . . . affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous."



MIDDLE STEPS IN A TIMELY MANNER

Pondering Step Five left me with a great deal of apprehension, but my sponsor didn't allow time to back out. The Big Book tells us to start Step Four "at once" (p. 64) after the Third Step Prayer and to get into Step Five at "first opportunity" (p. 74).

When was that? Well, my sponsor considered that to mean starting the Fifth Step just a few minutes after we went through the many actions suggested on Step Four (pp. 64-71).


There was no wiggle time for my alco-logical mind to "consider" yea or nay. Action—not thinking—was the key! Steps Six and Seven (P. 76) followed abruptly and before you can say Jack Robison (*An old fashion phrase*) I was starting to list amends. My Ninth Step amends continued as I began living in the spirit of Steps Ten, Eleven and Twelve.

This rapid process did not alleviate my mental obsession for alcohol by "next Thursday," so to speak however, throughout the next year it began to diminish as I continued daily AA meetings and spending most of my spare time with sober friends at different Los Angeles recovery clubs. After a year or so I realized those tempting "drinking thoughts" had all but disappeared and have not returned with any frequency. Consequently, I have not had anything alcoholic to drink since my first meeting. I believe doing the middle steps with my sponsor in a *timely manner* was very helpful.

Timeliness continues as I live in the spirit of maintenance steps Ten, Eleven and Twelve. I find it important to rectify my daily mistakes at once, quickly, and immediately (Step Ten). I pray morning day and night (Step Eleven) and make myself available throughout the day for AA work with other alcoholics (Step Twelve).

I thank God that my sponsor taught me the importance of acting in the now—tomorrow may be too late! Bob S



Step Six

Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.

The Big Book states:

"Returning home we find a place where we can be quiet for an hour, carefully reviewing what we have done. We thank God from the bottom of our heart that we know Him better. Taking this book down from our shelf we turn to the page which contains the twelve steps. Carefully reading the first five proposals we ask if we have omitted anything, for we are building an arch through which we shall walk a free man at last. Is our work solid so far? Are the stones properly in place? Have we skimped on the cement put into the foundation? Have we tried to make mortar without sand?

If we can answer to our satisfaction, we then look at Step Six. "We have emphasized willingness as being indispensable. Are we now ready to let God remove from us all the things which we have admitted are objectionable? Can He now take them all- every one? If we still cling to something we will not let go, we ask God to help us be willing."

Simply put, are we entirely ready and willing to change? After all, nothing changes if nothing changes, and if we remain the same person with the same character defects, chances of us staying sober are slim. If we want to be happy, joyous and free then we must be willing to change that which makes us the opposite. It's important to point out here, that we don't change by our own will; it's with the help of relying on a Higher Power that we are successful in this step.

The 12 & 12 says step six separates the men from the boys. The point is that by now you have done a lot of work and have faced the truth about you. At this point we try to strip away the old character for a new one. This is a lifetime process; occasionally the old character will emerge and will have to be dealt with. It is part of the process of continuously working these steps in our everyday lives. We seek progress, not perfection!

Step Six & Seven: Defects and Short Comings


The Habits of Credibility Lead to Integrity By Rick R.

Sometimes the wording used in The Big Book (Alcoholics Anonymous) and in The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions (12&12) mean something different to individuals often based on how they evolved with respect to Religion, Agnosticism, Atheism, and other developmental histories. This may be confusing to some of us, especially Step Six in the 12&12 as it talks of God removing these defects of character the way God removed the obsession to drink. In simple terms I try to word the Step Six process in a way anyone can understand it and my goal is not to offend anyone by being over simplistic but most of our actions and behaviors stem from our thinking and if our thinking is of a fearful nature, we are bound to make bad decisions while trying to defend ourselves.

The defects we identify in the Step Four inventory disclose in step five and address in Step Six, are biproducts of our fears and insecurities and are of a spiritual nature as in our inner self.

The shortcomings we address in Step Seven are of a material nature (actions and behaviors) that result from those fears and insecurities.

If, in the program, we discover a defect of character and address it properly the short coming diminishes and becomes irrelevant. A simpler way I try to describe this process is as follows: Suppose you purchased a new car and drove off the lot and as you reached the first stop sign you hit the brakes, the car slowed down but did not stop as it should and drifted out into the intersection. You then returned to the car lot and explained what happened, they checked it out and discovered that the wrong brakes were installed at the factory. They agreed to correct the mistake. This time when you drove away and approached the stop sign the car stopped as it was supposed to, and it also stopped at every other stop sign or red light. Once the defect was identified and corrected, the short coming went away. I look at defects as the unseen part of our makeup such as: thoughts, motives, fears, feelings, ego, etc. I look at shortcomings as the results of those inner thoughts and feelings such as: gossip, lying, verbal abuse, cheating, theft, criticism, and so on. In step four we identified our defects of character (fear and Insecurity) and in step five we owned and exposed them. In Step Six and Seven we start to replace our selfish and shameful thoughts and motives with unselfish habits and deeds. There is no need to overcomplicate the process. As we begin to stay on the unselfish side of the behavioral ledger, we begin to establish a new record, and if all our motives are of an unselfish spirit, we start to establish some credibility, which, in time, leads to integrity. If individuals employ the dynamics I described in Step Six and Seven, he/she will be a different person, in Spirit, when they reach Step nine, and it will make it much easier to make amends backed up by a mountain of integrity. The steps of the program are numbered in order for a reason and if a person is struggling with one of these steps it might be wise to look back and be sure that they did not skimp on an earlier step or leave out something important. If an Alcoholic has a desire to live a happy and useful life, the steps of the program are a pathway to achieve that goal provided they stick with the plan. Not everything will go our way in the beginning but, if we persist, in time things will go exceptionally well. In the words or Preacher Roe: "Sometimes you eat the Bear, Sometimes the Bear eats you." I say, "Perseverance will always eat the Bear"!



Neglect, The Elephant in the Room

Continuous Credibility Leads to Integrity

When we are satisfied that we have given steps one through five our best effort and have identified the most glaring defects of character and shortcomings, it is now time to affect the changes in the most obvious of our faulty thoughts and the behaviors that stem from those thoughts by addressing them in steps six and seven. To be successful in this endeavor, we must first get honest with ourselves and begin to establish some credibility and by that, I mean always doing the things we say we are going to do. We bring most of the basic flaws out in the open as we become aware of them. Then, if we are sure that we are committed to the program, we will want to set in place, principles to live by that cut off our own escape when we stumble and want to revert to that old way of thinking. Most of us do this with the help of a sponsor or a mentor, if you like, and go by the book as best we can. I did what I thought was a thorough job of it, then one day, about thirty years ago, I was trying to park my car in a somewhat crowded parking lot and as I found the spot I wanted there was a shopping cart blocking my way. I got out of my car and moved the cart aside, then parked my car. I then got that shopping cart and pushed it back to the store entrance, then went about my business. From that day on, when parking at any market, I search for a stray shopping cart and take it back to the store just to make up for all the times I shoved one into the flower bed and drove away. After telling that story at meetings over the years, I hear people telling how it is uncomfortable for them to leave the cart adrift in the parking lot, and we all get a big laugh out of it. Neglect, I can tell, the word neglect is only mentioned two times in the Big Book (pg. 97 and pg. 129) and two times in the 12&12. (pg. 81 and pg. 151) And seldom, if ever, has it been the topic of a meeting that I can recall. It is like the proverbial elephant in the room. As I started to catch myself shirking my responsibilities it became obvious to me that if I wanted to regain some form of self-respect and dignity, I was going to have to put the word *Neglect* on my list of shortcomings and question my integrity. Do I do what is right even when there is no one watching? If credibility is always doing what I say I am going to do, then Integrity, to me, is a whole bunch of credibility. To cut off my own escape I do routine things every day, that cost me nothing and the result of that is a clear conscience. If I am doing the little things that I should, I find it much easier to give the big things that same sort of attention. I never throw trash out of the car window, I pick up after myself, I never walk away from my bed in the morning without making it, and I liken that to being an unspoken prayer saying, I will be responsible, I will be orderly, I will be neat, and I will not be neglectful, I will be respectful, I will stay on the unselfish side of the ledger in all of my decisions, I sometimes revisit those pages in the Big Book and the 12&12 and I try my best not to ignore the elephant in the room.


