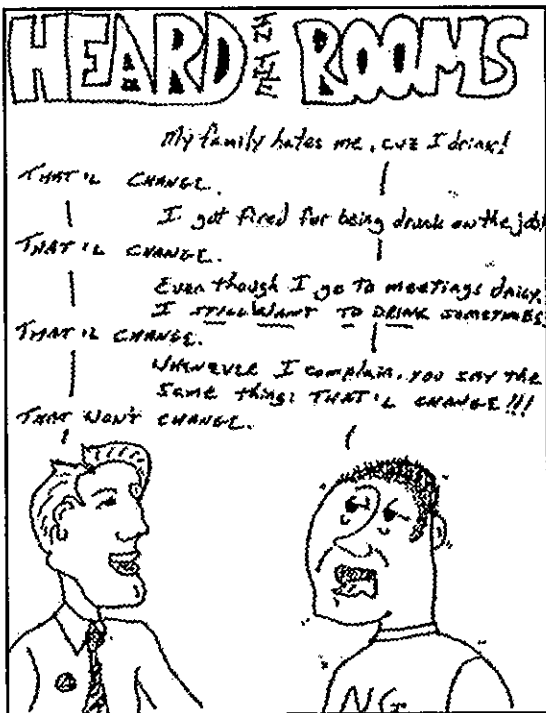


COACHELLA VALLEY HOSPITALS & INSTITUTIONS

As we hear in the AA Preamble at the start of every AA meeting, "Our primary purpose is to stay sober **and to help other alcoholics achieve sobriety.**" It is listed as a single purpose: to stay sober, **AND** to help other alcoholics achieve sobriety. It was helping other alcoholics to achieve sobriety that kept Bill W. and Dr. Bob sober in the early days of Alcoholics Anonymous. The two are inextricably linked; carrying the AA message to those that are still suffering helps us stay sober.

The purpose of Alcoholics Anonymous Hospitals & Institutions groups is to carry the message of Alcoholics Anonymous to the alcoholic who is confined. The Coachella Valley H&I Committee offers a wide variety of opportunities to be of service. There are panels for men and for women in jails and prisons, recovery facilities, a homeless shelter and mental health facilities from Desert Hot Springs to Indio.

Whether it was through intervention, court, or our loved ones, we came to AA to hear and learn what we can do to get better. Alcohol had the power and control, and our lives became unmanageable, which brought FEAR, ANXIETY, REMORSE and DEPRESSION.

Admitting we had a problem is our first step to RECOVERY.

Tradition One

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity.

The 12 Traditions are AA's way of keeping our groups strong and healthy as our Steps lay a path of recovery and a foundation for individual members. The first tradition is all about us sticking together and guaranteeing the unity of the fellowship. In doing my research for writing about Tradition One, I found this article by Bill. This covers it all, and I thought it would be better to reprint than anything I could have written.

Reprinted from the Grapevine, December, 1947

"Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. A.A. must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward."

Our whole A.A. program is securely founded on the principle of humility--that is to say, perspective. Which implies, among other things, that we relate ourselves rightly to God and to our fellows; that we each see ourselves as we really are--"a small part of a great whole." Seeing our fellows thus, we shall enjoy group harmony. That is why A.A. Tradition One can confidently state, "Our common welfare comes first." Does this mean, "some will ask, "that in A.A. the individual doesn't count too much? Is he to be swallowed up, dominated by the group?" No, it doesn't seem to work out that way. Perhaps there is no society on earth more solicitous of personal welfare, more careful to grant the individual the greatest possible liberty of belief and action. Alcoholics Anonymous has no "musts." Few A.A. groups impose penalties on anyone for non-conformity. We do suggest, but we don't discipline. Instead, compliance or non-compliance with any principle of A.A. is a matter for the conscience of the individual; he is the judge of his own conduct. Those words of old time, "Judge not," we observe most literally. "But," some will argue, "if A.A. has no authority to govern its individual members or groups, how shall it ever be sure that the common welfare does come first? How is it possible to be governed without a government? If everyone can do as he pleases, how can you have aught but anarchy?"

The answer seems to be that we A.A.s cannot really do as we please, though there is no constituted human authority to restrain us. Actually, our common welfare is protected by powerful safeguards. The moment any action seriously threatens the common welfare, group opinion mobilizes to remind us; our conscience begins to complain. If one persists, he may become so disturbed as to get drunk; alcohol gives him a beating. Group opinion shows him that he is off the beam, his own conscience tells him that he is dead wrong, and, if he goes too far, Barleycorn brings him real conviction. So it is we learn that in matters deeply affecting the group as a whole, "our common welfare comes first." Rebellion ceases and cooperation begins because it must; we have disciplined ourselves.

Eventually, of course, we cooperate because we really wish to; we see that without substantial unity there can be no A.A., and that without A.A. there can be little lasting recovery for anyone. We gladly set aside personal ambitions whenever these might harm A.A. We humbly confess that we are but "a small part of a great whole." - Bill W.

Concept I

Final Responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship.

Alcoholics Anonymous has been called an upside-down organization because the "ultimate responsibility and final authority for...world services" resides with the groups—rather than with the trustees of the General Service Board or the General Service Office in New York.

In **Concept I** Bill traces how this came to be. The first step in 1938 was "the creation of the trusteeship," first called the Alcoholic Foundation, renamed in 1954 the General Services Board. Why? To perform the services the groups could not do for themselves; e.g. uniform literature, uniform public information about A.A., helping new groups get started, sharing with them the experience of established groups, handling pleas for help, publishing a national magazine, and carrying the message in other languages and in other countries. A service office was formed to carry on these functions under the board's direction. Both the board and the office looked to the co-founders Bill and Dr. Bob, for policy leadership.

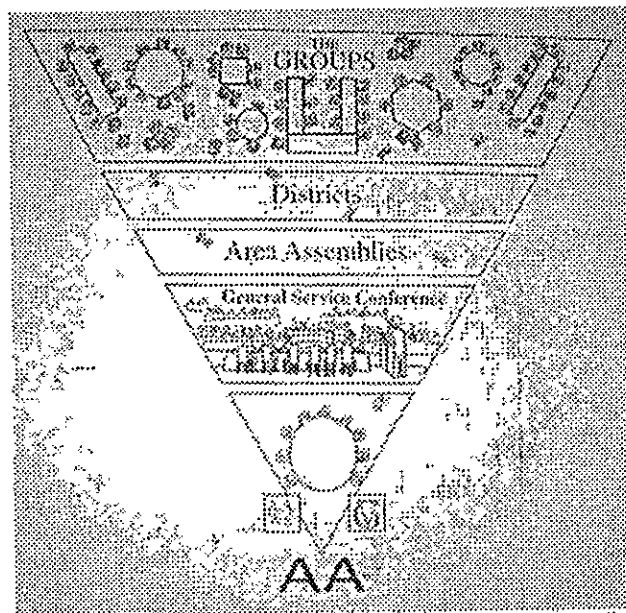
In the midst of the "exuberant success" of early A.A., Dr. Bob became fatally ill and Bill asked, "When Dr. Bob and I are gone, who would then advise the trustees and the office? The answer, Bill felt, was to be found in the collective conscience of the A.A. Groups. But how could the autonomous, widely scattered groups exercise such a responsibility?

In final, it was decided at by an A.A. General Service Conference that **Concept I** is rooted in Tradition Two, which states:

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern."

The principles of Tradition Two are crystal-clear, Bill asserts: "The A.A. groups are to be the final authority; their leaders are to be entrusted with delegated responsibilities only." The outside world cannot imagine an organization run this way but Bill calls it "a spiritualized society characterized by enough enlightenment, enough responsibility, and enough love of man and of God to insure that our democracy of world service will work..."

Look, AA is organized upside down! The World will never understand!

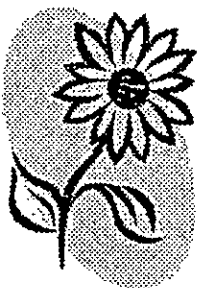
