

## Tradition Two

*For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority - a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern.*

Tradition Two was, and is, intended to remove ego and personal authority from the day to day operation of the A.A. Group. Each group is a fellowship of equals. No matter what an individual member's background, education, or professional expertise, no member has authority "over" the group. In this way, the fellowship reaches out to all who would seek comfort. The group should provide an atmosphere or a sense of "being a part of" to all members who seek relief from the disease of alcoholism.

Tradition two clearly states that "Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern" Therefore we are required to have leader's for each group, and these leader's or committee's should be made up of members from the group, elected by members of the group and should rotate on a regular basis, lest problems of authority rear up among the members of group.




## Being Honest with Myself The Denial Within Me Was Gone

Years before I came to AA, I was aware that there was something dreadfully wrong with me but not one person ever suggested that I might be an alcoholic or that I should try AA. Perhaps that was due to the denial of the people around me that drank like I did. Suggesting that I had a problem with alcohol would mean outing themselves and others. Looking back on it now, I feel fortunate that I survived those last few years of failed attempts at life and when I ran out of options, I came to AA looking for answers. The denial within me was gone. My mind was open and for the first time in my life I was *desperate*, and I was *listening*. At my first AA meeting I was moved by what I heard. It was different than anything I had experienced before. The people were *being honest and candid about things that only brought shame and guilt to me in the past. I felt safe for the first time in my life* and could discuss those things openly, that had been taboo up until then. Prior to that, everything in my life was a façade. At that moment On October 15, 1969, my *perception* of the world had changed, and I have not wanted a drink since. Call it a *Spiritual Awakening* if you like, and it was for me, but it came in the form of a *Profound Change in Perception*. In appendices 2, in the Big Book, (Alcoholics Anonymous) it describes a man who had “*undergone a profound alteration in his reaction to life*”. I began to question all the decisions I had made in the past, and how the residue of those decisions had tarnished and eroded any chance of a successful, happy life. I became aware that the *values system* that I had learned as a child, at church and at the Boy Scout meetings etc. was lost in the dust and was *replaced with guilt and shame*. I was in trouble when I violated *my own value system*. I now realize that I was not a bad kid, but I was a child that was not strong enough to do the things I knew to be right. The more I broke the rules, the easier it became, and *moral standards were meaningless*. Soon drinking was the only thing that eased my conscience. When that quit working for me, I found myself at the door of AA. Once I had that *change of perception*, I knew what to do. It may be as simple as “*trying to stop doing the things that I regret*” but the key to it all is “*Being honest with myself*,” and never going back to my old way of thinking. I said that I was fortunate to have survived those last few years of drinking and that I came to AA looking for answers. Being desperate enough to ask for help was the most important part of that experience. I do not believe that anyone could have convinced me to stop drinking against my will. I may have stayed dry long enough to get the heat off, but I doubt that I would have *surrendered to the degree necessary to have that change of perception and therefore no spiritual awakening*. Getting off in the right direction from the start was especially important to any success I have had in AA. I know that I only live once, and *I do not want to waste one moment of the precious life God gave me*. Today, as I continue to practice all the things I have learned in the Program, it has resulted in a peace of mind that was unimaginable when I first walked through the doors of Alcoholics Anonymous and, for that, I am extremely grateful.

## **Letter from the Editor**

Central Office recently shared that we ended last calendar year with a \$15,000 deficit. Our accounting firm reported to the Board of Directors that this was mainly caused by a drop in group and individual contributions. Our annual budget is based on previous year's income and expenditures, and the December budget report on page 21 shows the annual budget deficit of \$5,782 in Group and Individual contributions alone year to date.

The Board is now looking at ways to help Treasurers and members understand better what's happening and how we might turn this trend around in 2026 and beyond.

Although this report looks at just one year, it needs to be viewed in the context of changes over the past five years. Since our society closed in 2020, the type and frequency of meeting attendance has changed. More members now attend digital meetings. Many of these Zoom meetings are not connected to our local area, even though Central Office supports them. This is not to minimize the value of Zoom meetings hosted by local members, many of which contribute generously. Another issue is there are some Zoom meetings in our directory that are not hosted by local members has led to a reduced amount distributed to local Arms of Service, including our Central Office.

In the past, in-person meetings were the main source of contributions. Baskets were passed, cash was collected, and funds were shared each month using suggested percentages: 50% to Central Office, 30% to A.A. World Services, and 10% each to District and Area 9. This system supported Central Office adequately for the last 47 years. As fewer baskets are passed and cash contributions decline, that system no longer works the way it once did. On top of that, one dollar in 1960 is worth about eleven cents today. The long-standing "dollar in the basket" tradition needs to be re-evaluated in context with the decline in the value of the US dollar

Another idea is to offer a Treasurer/Secretary Workshop. This would give members a chance to better understand these service roles and how they support A.A. as a whole. This could clarify any confusion or misunderstandings that members of our Fellowship deserve answers to.

My commitment here is to preserve the viability and worthiness of our office to serve the needs of our local Fellowship with every resource available.

## Like the Layers of an Onion

No One can be Turned Away

The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking. (Trad. Three 12&12) After many years of sobriety and practicing the AA principles to the best of my ability, I am amazed at what I see in the meetings that I attend. It was one of the most important developments in my later years of sobriety. Removing my judgmentalism of other people in AA, that have a desire to stop drinking. I have come to understand that tradition, but it did not happen immediately. I was overwhelmed with personal problems that eventually culminated into my surrender and came to AA searching for answers. I am so grateful that they did not turn me away because I had problems.

The AA Program is so much deeper than I ever could have imagined when I first entered it. Over time, I recognize the depth of each issue that we face when we come clean with ourselves and with the world around us. It is sometimes likened to the layers of an onion. The surface skin begins to fall away quickly as we address the drinking part of our disease. Each layer is preparatory to the next. As we recognize and begin to discard the negative side of our thoughts and behaviors, we begin to understand that our thinking is where the problems lie, and our behaviors are the symptoms of that faulty thinking when our natural instincts far exceed their intended purpose.

In my early days of sobriety my mentors suggested that if I plan to attend a certain number of meetings per week, one of them should be a step study meeting and I have followed that suggestion ever since. One of the benefits of that decision is that we study each step four times a year and each time I repeat a previous step I notice an improvement in my understanding of that step. In the presence of that group, I may hear 20 to 30 different perspectives on how to address my faulty thinking and all those viewpoints are stored in my mind as I peel away one more layer of the onion. I learned the value of living by unselfish principles and that simple understanding takes most of my decision-making out of my hands. Principles are not flexible, and I do not create my own principles. I do, however, have the ability to follow well-established ethics and even then, sometimes things may go wrong but my motives are of an unselfish nature, and I do my best. I learn to be prudent when it comes to my decisions. I learn to decide if it was my Ego or my Conscience making that choice and today my Conscience renders my Ego irrelevant for the most part. I have always known right from wrong but with my fears and insecurities I usually made the wrong, selfish decision and my conscience suffered. If I already know when I am doing the wrong thing, why am I praying to God when I already know the answer and still make the wrong choice? It is true that the only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking but in AA I found so much more.

Within the safety of my AA group, I get to test these qualities out and establish a new perspective, unselfish in nature, as I peel away layer after layer and my load gets lighter and lighter. I no longer look at this process to be ponderous. I now see it as exciting and I want to continue to look deeper into my spiritual condition, living by the dictates of my conscience, and I hope this process never ends as I trudge that road of happy destiny.



## **Step Two**

### **Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.**

When I attended an AA meeting for the first time three and half years ago, it was my own decision and I went alone. The place was at the Joslyn Senior Center in a local city park. I had sat in on an AA meeting almost 8 years previously, only to go out and try once again to prove to myself that I really could control my drinking. I tried every plan I could think of to “drink normally” but failure piled upon failure. More alcohol was always better and my daily alcohol consumption kept increasing until I found myself passing out night after night. Sneaky behavior and broken promises to myself ate at my self-esteem. I didn’t like who I saw in the mirror. My father had died of the disease and I saw myself following in his footsteps. My best thinking and will power were not working and I became desperate to get help.

At this meeting, a small group of people were sitting in a circle, reading aloud and whenever a paragraph meant something significant to an individual, that person shared what those words meant to them. I was welcomed and given a book with which to read along. I was comfortable immediately. Deep inside I felt safe and hopeful. My strongest feeling was a willingness to take direction. I didn’t think of myself as insane but I was helpless about wanting alcohol. My repeated decisions to keep drinking knowing the consequences were insane. My blackouts resonated with insanity. There was hope in this group of strangers. There was direction I could take. I was sure that I, by myself, could not stop drinking and these people in the room had succeeded for various lengths of time not to pick up a drink. And they seemed much more joyous and comfortable with themselves than I was. For the first time in years I felt like I was in the right place and making a good, reasonable decision.

During the break, I said something about wishing I had stopped drinking years ago and I was quickly shushed and told to accept the present as being just what it should be. That sounded freeing to me. I was welcomed by a woman with 25 years of sobriety who assisted me in purchasing my own copy of the book being studied at this meeting. I was encouraged to keep coming back and told about other meetings nearby.

Why am I writing about all this? The second step states “came to believe....” This step is a process: an opportunity for growth and a change in perception. One “comes to believe” by going to lots of meetings, and being honest and vulnerable with a sponsor. There was Power in the group of simple, honest people who shared success, strength and hope. For me there is a Power within every single person and I experience that in every honest story, every vulnerable revelation, and each unselfish service extended to others. I became willing to trust in their success, their wisdom. I decided to “drink in” and be a part of their Power. That Power has made all the difference. I am not the same person I used to be when I was drinking. I have been delivered from an obsession and I go to meetings regularly and willingly because more of that Power keeps revealing itself in new and marvelous ways.

The idea of sanity has changed for me too. I used to connect insanity with people in asylums, which meant this step didn’t apply to me. I have come to see that the way I lived life was insane. My insanity was in not taking responsibility for my choices, using people and things destructively, my lying to look better than I was, cheating and hurting others. But I always had my excuse. The sanity I learned in AA is a way of life that is giving, honest, right-sized, humble, loving, and growing. It is always willing to learn and accept life on life’s terms. It’s the way my sponsor, Dave, lives his life and hundreds who have taught me a better way of life in simple AA sharing one alcoholic to another, one day at a time. That’s how this Power continues to reveal itself. I am so blessed.
